1	Welcome from the Chairman and introductions	Actions
	The Chairman commenced the meeting by extending a warm welcome to Luther Blissett OBE DL, attending to represent His Majesty's the Lord-Lieutenant of Hertfordshire and to all attendees present. Subsequently, each participant introduced themselves, providing their name and organisation as part of the customary round of introductions.	
2	Apologies and substitutions	
	Cllr Hill noted the apologies (listed above) and substitutions. Luther Blissett OBE DL attended to represent His Majesty's the Lord-Lieutenant of Hertfordshire at the meeting today.	

3	Minutes and actions from the previous meeting held 28 September 2023	
	Cllr Hill introduced the agenda item and asked if Board members had any comments from previous meeting minutes held 28 September 2023.	
	Item 6 – it was raised that the statement about Department of Education stating that it will no longer match the Ministry of Defence daily allowance for Combined Cadet Force adult instructors in state schools was since unable to be corroborated. It was agreed that the minutes from 28 September 2023 would not be amended but a note would be added to these minutes.	
	The minutes from 28 September 2023 were agreed.	
4	Standing item: The Military Perspective	
	The Chairman invited the following Board members to share their updates.	
	Deputy Lieutenant Luther Blissett, representing His Majesty's Lord-Lieutenant of Hertfordshire Mr Robert Voss, gave an update. Mr Blissett said that Forces United have been working on improving housing for veterans, mental health issues and suicide prevention. Projects include encouraging football clubs to establish breakfast clubs for the armed forces community.	
	<ul> <li>Colonel Clinton Read form Northwood HQ said: <ul> <li>Northwood HQ continues to be the centre of gravity for Defence's Operational Command and Control.</li> <li>Northwood HQ will shortly trial a green travel scheme, a shuttle bus in the local community which aims to deliver on their climate change and community objectives, whilst relieving pressure on the limited on site parking.</li> <li>Looking forward to supporting the local community with the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of D-Day.</li> <li>Several Afghan families have been housed in married quarters in Hertfordshire.</li> <li>The Royal Navy Volunteer Band had a successful 25th Anniversary concert in October raising money for charity.</li> <li>Northwood HQ has been involved in this year's Christmas art competition from judging the shortlisted artwork to attending school assemblies. This was the first year it was expanded into special educational needs schools and as a result they will deliver a bespoke day at Woolgrove school as the prize for that winner. The Day of Adventure, organised by Northwood HQ, is taking place on 19 March with the Lord Lieutenant, Chairman and Vice Chairman of Hertfordshire Armed Forces Covenant Board and Chairman of Hertfordshire County Council planning to attend.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

	POST MEETING NOTE	
	Ian Pearce shared some information after the meeting about transition arrangements for carers when they stop caring. A summary has been added to the minutes for Board member's information.	

	Carers in Herts says that a big issue for bereaved carers is the loss of income. For example if they, or the person they cared for receives Attendance Allowance or PIP, a mobility vehicle, Carers Allowance and any domiciliary care, it will cease once they stop caring. Bereaved carers can continue to use all Carers in Herts services for three years after their caring role stops, they can access the bereavement service as well as development and learning sessions. DWP says the Universal Credit Operational Guidance about Carers states, "UC works for carers as it gives support to those who can only work part-time due to their caring responsibilities and when people are able to increase their working hours when caring responsibilities change. Work coaches should always ensure that any work-related activities are tailored to the individual's circumstances. Commitments from carers is to be defined on a case-by-case basis. Jobcentres focus on getting people into work if they can work. Caring responsibilities differ but if someone needs to care for someone for more than 35 hours per week, they should not be expected to undertake any other work or work search activities. As a further example, if they provide care for 20 hours per week, they should not be expected to work or search for work for 15 hours. Even then, there is flexibility regarding individual circumstances.

	Chief Inspector Bartlett explained work that has begun to train police officers to "ask the question" when speaking with people who are homeless. There are also plans to work with the Domestic Violence team and women's safe refuges.	

	<ul> <li>There was a discussion about: <ul> <li>the use of the word veteran and the phrase Armed Forces community.</li> <li>legislation that someone must have left the Military within 5 years to have the local connection clause not apply when seeking social housing. Andy Stephenson thinks that all District and Borough Councils already have a policy to remove the local connection requirement for those who have served regardless of the date they left.</li> </ul> </li> <li>It was agreed that Board members involved in the above discussion points would have a further meeting to agree a way forward.</li> <li>Colonel Clint Read said that he would caution that research into defence policy (in draft objective 5) is out of scope for this group and suggested focus could go elsewhere. 	<ol> <li>The Health Subgroup covers 3 areas:         <ol> <li>Social prescribing – all social prescribing teams are being trained by Op COMMUNITY colleagues at HCNS in working with veterans and support available.</li> <li>Primary Care – 134 practices across the Herts and West Essex ICB are organised into 34 Primary Care Networks covering 1.6million people. All but 1 PCNs have at least 1 Veteran Friendly accredited practice. There is a lot of work to ensure we have a practice in all PCNs accredited.</li> <li>Secondary Care – All but one Trusts in Hertfordshire (including acute, community and mental health) are accredited as Veteran Aware. The <u>Veterans Covenant Healthcare Alliance</u> works with Trusts to assist in accreditation.</li> </ol> </li> </ol>	Harper Brown and Cllr Andrews to connect after the meeting regarding the PCN to be accredited as Veteran Friendly
